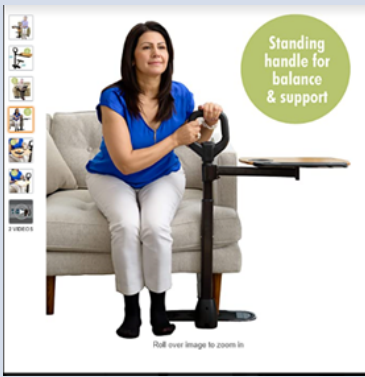
Social Health Kit

Social Health Kit

The Social Health Kit includes items that combat loneliness and promote social connections. According to the National Institute of Health's, National Institute on Aging older adults are at higher risk for loneliness and social isolation due to a variety of changes in health and social connections. Through the collaboration of NWD and VATS, this kit and others were developed to connect vulnerable populations to the AT professionals and equipment which will improve social inclusion and minimize stress associated with loneliness.

The Social Health Kit focuses on four (4) main objectives:

- To improve communication/connections with friends and family through automation devices.
- To assist with mental health issues related to isolation through calming, focusing, and anxiety-reducing devices
- To improve security in the home through high-tech devices
- To assist with sanitization of items coming into the home or being shared within the home through cleaning supplies and UV equipment



Swivel Tray Table with Stand Assist

Tray for individuals who benefit from items being at their fingertips. Tray can be used for things like phones, magazines, books, snacks and more. This specific model features a handle for assistance in getting up from a chair.

Smart Speakers (ie. Facebook Portal, Echo Show, Google Home)

Staying in touch with family and friends has never been easier! These devices can be used to check in on someone using the video chat features, access the internet for information, set reminders and more!



Webcams

Webcams are a great way to connect with friends and family virtually. Webcams allow visualization of loved ones, whether connecting one-on-one or in groups.

Wi-Fi Picture Frame

Digital picture frames are devices used to display digital photos without the need of a computer or printer. It can be a great way to share family photos and events all in one place. Some models even allow for family or friends to send photos directly to your frame.



Phone/Tablet Stand

Holding technology devices may not be accessible for all. Devices such as phone or tablet stands may be a great option for those who experience pain or are unable to hold their devices.

Soft Fidget Blanket

Soft fidget blankets have been proven to help soothe and comfort while providing tactile activities. Blankets such as these incorporate items to touch and move in the safety of the individual's lap.

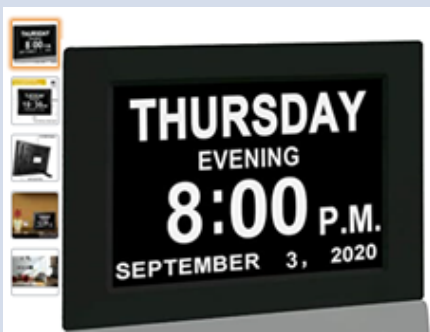
Artificial Fish Aquarium

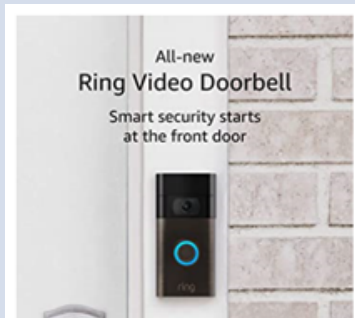


Magnifier-Screen Magnifier

Emergency Preparedness Kit

Emergency Preparedness Kit

The purpose of the *Emergency Preparedness Kit* is to demonstrate a few affordable and user-friendly technologies and assistive technology devices that can help older adults and Virginians with disabilities plan for, develop and/or add to their own emergency kit. This is not an exhaustive list, but can be used to help start the conversations and encourage families/individuals to make and personalize their own kits!



Additional items to consider when creating your Emergency Kit

- Cooler/ Ice Packs
- List of Medications and any extra medications
- Face Mask
- Extra Batteries
- Gloves
- Hand Sanitizer
- Germicidal Wipes
- Assorted bandages and antiseptics
- Personal Care Items
- Emergency Contacts list and healthcare providers list
- Bottled Water
- Shelf-stable food (ie. peanut butter, powdered milk, instant coffee, canned goods)
- Sharpie or labels to mark expiration dates
- Pet food



Plug In/ Rechargeable Emergency Flashlight

Plug In/ Rechargeable Emergency Flashlights can provide a reliable option for light in the event of power outage. By keeping these plugged in, you will always know they are ready. Your fall risk is increased when walking in the dark.

Emergency Radio, Flashlight, Smartphone Charger and Red Beacon

An emergency radio is an essential item for any Emergency Preparedness Kit because it provides up-to-date information in the event of an emergency. This model includes a flashlight, emergency beacon and smart phone charger.

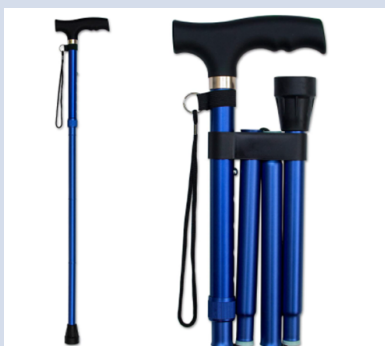


Solar Charge Power Bank

Almost everyone has devices or technology powered by batteries. In the event of a power outage, especially a prolonged outage, a solar charge power bank is a great option for keeping your devices charged and available to use in the event of emergency communications.

Safety Whistle

A safety whistle is an item you want to have on you at all times. In the event of an emergency, your voice may not be loud enough for emergency personnel to hear you. A safety whistle provides a sound loud enough while requiring significantly less air.



Folding Cane

Include a folding cane into your emergency kit, regardless of whether you use a device like this on a regular basis. In the event of an emergency, you may need additional assistance in navigating around your home or community. The folding design makes for easy storage.



Touchless Forehead Thermometer

Touchless Forehead Thermometers are a great addition to your emergency kit. The touchless feature allows for multiple people to use it and the color indicator allows for easy fever readings.

Battery Operated Can Opener

When the power goes out, it's time to open the canned goods, but a manual can opener might be difficult to manage. A battery operated can opener is a great option for individuals who struggle to use a manual can opener.



Kitchen Helper Jar and Bottle Openers

Various jar and bottle openers can be a helpful addition to your emergency kit whether you struggle to get jars open or just want a less stressful solution. Take an inventory of your non-perishable items to see what kind of "Kitchen Helpers" you may want to include.

Spring Loaded Easy Action Shears

Regular scissors may not be cutting it. Using a pair of spring loaded scissors, can help individuals who may struggle to open and close traditional scissors. The spring loaded design provides less resistance making easier cuts.



Pet Supply- Storage Container

When planning out your emergency kit, you can't forget your pets! Always include food and treats for your furry friend. A container such as this one can be used to safely store their food and easily measure it out.
